Recent work

Advertising complaint

THE LAC HAS made a complaint to the Advertising Standards Authority about a life insurance advertisement. Using the rhyme Three Blind Mice, it insinuates buying their life insurance will stop you becoming disabled. In our opinion, it is offensive towards disabled people and should not be on social media or television. We have appealed to the ASA and have written to the advertising agency who made the advert and the insurance company to educate them on disability.

Immigration policy is discriminatory

THE LAC HAS been concerned with the current immigration settings that make it very difficult for overseas-born disabled people to reside in New Zealand. The reasoning behind this is that disabled people will cost more when accessing public health. We met with Juliana Carvalho, who has been lobbying for changes to the immigration settings so that disabled people have freedom when deciding which country to reside in. We also met with Green MP Ricardo Menendez March, who actively supports a change in immigration policy.

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Karanga Maha

Kia ora koutou katoa,

KO SHANAN KOHI tāku ingoa. My name is Shanan Kohi, I am a part of a roopu called Karanga Maha, which means "Many Voices". This allows our Rangatahi (young people) and other people with a disability that haven't had a voice to speak for themselves, without their loved ones speaking for them. Karanga Maha is also a safe place for them to be themselves. Our dream is to go global, but first we start in our own backyard of Aotearoa. The first Karanga Maha was in Auckland/Northland over 10 years ago. Now we are in Tauranga, Taranaki and Hamilton.

We had a gathering at the end of September and the topic was Rongoā (Māori Medicine). We learned about the different plants we can use for medical purposes. These plants are: Kawakawa (Pepper Tree); Kūmarahou (Gum digger's soap, Golden Tainui); Teteaweka (Daisy Flower); Manukā (Leptospermum scoparium). These plants and trees and many more from the Ngahere (forest) were used in the past by my ancestors and are still used for health problems we experience these days. If you want to find out more, you can look online.



We also learned about Mirimiri bodywork, a traditional Māori healing practice that rebalances function and releases deeply held tension in the body through agitation of tissue, muscle, bone, blood and fluid.


Auckland transport updates

Taking a private vehicle into mid-town Auckland

CHANGES ARE RAPIDLY occurring in downtown Auckland. If you are taking your own vehicle into the Town Hall, Civic, Aotea Centre area you will need to know what streets you can and cannot drive down as shown in image below. Parking is still available in the Civic car park, but this doesn't work for high-sided hoist vehicles.

Through the Public Transport Accessibility Group (PTAG) we are working to ensure pick-up/ drop-off is available in the vicinity. This is being provided outside the Town Hall and Smith & Caughey with a generous 30-minute time limit.

Existing parking on the other side of Queen Street, near Wakefield Street remains as is. We had previously persuaded Auckland Transport (AT) to make these overnight parks because there is no easy parking solution for out-of-towners with hoist vehicles coming into the city for entertainment and staying in hotels.



Plus-one bus companion

AT HAS INTRODUCED a scheme allowing Total Mobility Card users to bring a support person on the bus for free. Because street parking in Auckland is gradually being reduced and greater emphasis placed on public transport, this has the potential to have huge impact on people with mobility and stamina issues. Many have never used public transport and this is an excellent initiative to introduce new users to the bus network.

We are working constantly through PTAG to improve bus design and features, but it is still far from perfect. There are many older buses that do not meet the current improved interior design giving sufficient manoeuvring space for larger power wheelchairs. Watch this space!
